CHURCH THAT BEARS THE CRUCIFIED & RISEN LORD

It is striking that so many members of this congregation state that the reason they chose St. Paul's to be the congregation in which they live out their faith is because it was here where they felt at home; here where they felt like they belonged. Here they experienced acceptance. One of our youth members observed, "Now I know what it's like to belong."

The mission statement which our congregation adopted at the Annual Meeting in January emphasizes this commitment which is core to our congregation: *Growing a Christian community where each is valued, accepted, and loved.* This month, when we celebrate Easter and the Resurrection of our Lord, we focus on acceptance in light of the death and resurrection of Christ.

As Christians, God calls us to see one another and all people through the lens of the death and resurrection of Christ. Paul says it best when he writes in his second letter to the Corinthians:

¹⁶From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. ¹⁷So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything

The deeply shared desire to offer this from so many members of this congregation reveals that this is central to who God has made this community of faith to be. It also witnesses in the month of Holy Week to Christ who died for all.



This month in addition to reviewing reports on ministry from each committee, the Council also planned in conjunction with the Organ Task Force a Round Table Discussion on April 10 to ensure that there are opportunities for input and participation regarding the future of our organ. We also discussed how we might promote transparency with our work and decisions within the congregation. One strategy for demystifying how to be involved in the ministries of this congregation which is being developed by the Council and committees is a Celebration and Community Fair (see p. 5).

Please note that Carroll Mayhugh resigned from Council for personal and health reasons. Per the constitution of the congregation, C12.03, “Should a member’s place on the Church Council be declared vacant, the Church Council shall select a successor to fill the unexpired term. The selection shall first be made from the ballot of the preceding election in order of votes cast.” Accordingly, Council appointed Joy Niefield who shall serve through June 2022.

At this meeting, Council elected a new Vice President: John Cathcart.

Council members would like to thank Carroll Mayhugh for his leadership and service and for the initiatives he championed during his service. We see the Holy Spirit in you.

Guidelines for Attending the Quarterly Meeting Remotely

1. **Login time.** Login will be available starting at 11:30 am, Sunday, April 24.
2. **Signing in and out.** Members shall identify themselves as required to sign into the Internet meeting service and shall maintain Internet and audio access throughout the meeting whenever present, but shall sign out in the chat room upon any departure before adjournment. After signing in the member shall mute the connection and only unmute when recognized. The Recording Secretary will log all connections and disconnections validating that the person(s) joining are voting members of the congregation. This log will become part of the official record of the meeting (minutes).
3. **Technical requirements and mal-functions.** Each member is responsible for his or her audio and Internet connections; no action shall be invalidated on the grounds that the loss of, or poor quality of, a member's individ-
- ual connection prevented participation in the meeting.
4. **Forced disconnections.** The Chair may cause or direct the disconnection or muting of a member's connection if it is causing undue interference with the meeting. The Chair's decision to do so, which is subject to an undeniable appeal that can be made by any member, shall be announced during the meeting and recorded in the minutes.
5. **Assignment of the floor.** To seek recognition by the Chair, a member shall request recognition via the chat room. The member shall include his or her name and the reason they request recognition. The Meeting Coordinator shall monitor the chat room and relay recognition requests to the Chair in the order received.
6. **Interrupting a member.** A member who intends to make a motion or request that under the rules may inter-

rupt a speaker shall use the chat room for so indicating and shall thereafter wait a reasonable time for the Chair's instructions before attempting to interrupt the speaker by voice.

7. **Motions submitted in writing.** A member intending to make a motion, to offer an amendment shall, before or after being recognized, post the motion in writing to meetings@stpaulreading.org, the subject line shall include the member's name and subject of the motion or amendment. The Meeting Coordinator shall share the contents of the motion or amendment to the screen when requested by the Chair.
8. **Voting.** For votes not requiring a written ballot, members shall vote by voice (in-person only), using the chat room or the "raise hand" feature, at the discretion of the Chair. For a voice, chat room, or count of hands vote the Chair shall determine the outcome or the need for a roll call. The count shall be maintained by the Recording Secretary.
9. **Roll Call Votes.** For votes requiring a roll call the Recording Secretary shall call the roll of all the members present and tally the results.
10. **Written or secret ballot.** For votes requiring a written or secret ballot, the President will announce the deadline

for submission during the meeting. members may vote as follows:

- a. Members present in-person will be provided with a ballot and may fill it in and submit it immediately or return it as directed by the chair. Members present via Zoom may mail in their ballot to the church office by the date specified by the chair during the meeting.
 - b. Completed ballots must include the printed and signed name of the voting member and/or the member's giving envelope number. Electronic ballots must include member's name and a valid email address for confirmation, this will suffice as the confirming signature. Any ballots not properly signed will not be counted.
 - c. For the Quarterly meeting, only ballots from members listed as present in-person or online for the meeting will be counted. Absentee ballots, i.e., ballots from members not present, are only allowed for election of Church Council and will only be counted for election of Church Council.
11. **Adjournment.** The Chair shall entertain a motion to adjourn when requested. The motion must be seconded and voted on by the hand raise method in person or online, the Meeting Coordinator shall report to the Chair the count.


A service commemorating Jesus' procession into Jerusalem with palm branches and cheering crowds.

ORGAN TASK FORCE ROUND TABLE ON APRIL 10

Are you passionate about St. Paul's pipe organ and the music it provides for worship? Would you like to offer input about the future of our organ? If so, plan to stay after worship on Palm Sunday, April 10, for a round table discussion with the Organ Task Force -- a light lunch will be provided.

Over the past few months, the Organ Task Force has met to contemplate the future of the organ at St. Paul. As many of you may recall, we have had ongoing tuning issues with the pipes as well as electronic issues that have disrupted worship on more than one occasion. We have consulted with three different vendors, each of which are experts in the field, to determine what possible solutions exist for the organ. Although the final decision on how to proceed will ultimately lie with Church Council, the Organ Task Force would like your input before making its formal recommendation to Council. Therefore, you are invited to participate in this brief presentation and roundtable discussion. At that time we will present you with the potential options as well as a survey for you to consider, complete, and return either physically or virtually. There will be time for questions and your input.

The Organ Task Force and Council are committed to making this a participatory process in which all members have ample opportunity to have their voice heard. This is a very important decision for the church, and we hope you can make it!
